Class Activities to Achieve Objectives	
Project - Review of Electronic Resources	Since most of us use electronic references more than we do heavy books, this course will focus on electronic resources. One objective is to provide each student in the class with the opportunity to think about parenteral nutrition issues for a variety of different patients. Each student will be assigned as the TPN pharmacist on call with telephone questions posted by the course instructor.</p>
